






GENDER PRONOUNS

As an association that recognizes and appreciates diversity in relation to, gender identity and expression, NASPA strives to create an inclusive environment at professional development events for all attendees. This effort is intended to reduce the unintended use of inaccurate pronouns and misgendering of conference attendees.

New for 2015, we provided opportunities for individuals to indicate their pronoun during the registration process so that it will print directly on the name badge upon check-in. This effort is designed to reduce the discomfort that one may experience should one conference attendee reference another with an inaccurate pronoun. We encourage everyone to include their pronoun on their name badge!

Melissa Harris-Perry

Melissa Harris-Perry

Melissa Harris-Perry will speak to the NASPA Annual Conference attendees about race, gender, and politics and how each has an impact on how students see the world. With events like the Ferguson verdict, Harris-Perry is poised to discuss how student affairs administrators can have an impact on both the higher education community and society at-large through our work on campus.

Melissa V. Harris-Perry is host of MSNBC's "Melissa Harris-Perry." The show airs on Saturdays and Sundays from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. EST.

On July 1, 2014, Harris-Perry returned to her alma mater, Wake Forest University, as professor of Politics and International Affairs. Harris-Perry has been named a Presidential Chair, an endowed position that recognizes and supports exceptional faculty who embody Wake Forest's teacher-scholar ideas. Harris-Perry joins Wake Forest from Tulane University, where she has served on the faculty since 2011. She previously served on the faculties of the University of Chicago and Princeton University.

Harris-Perry is founding director of the Anna Julia Cooper Project on Gender, Race, and Politics in the South. Named for the foundational black feminist intellectual, activist, and educator of the early 20th century, the Anna Julia Cooper Project supports related programs, courses and research and will move with Harris-Perry to Wake Forest.

Harris-Perry is author of the well-received book, *Sister Citizen: Shame, Stereotypes, and Black Women in America* (Yale 2011) which argues that persistent harmful stereotypes-invisible to many but painfully familiar to black women-profoundly shape black women's politics, contribute to policies that treat them unfairly, and make it difficult for black women to assert their rights in the political arena.

Her first book, *Barbershops, Bibles, and BET: Everyday Talk and Black Political Thought*, won the 2005 W. E. B. Du Bois Book Award from the National Conference of Black Political Scientists and 2005 Best Book Award from the Race and Ethnic Politics Section of the American Political Science Association.

Her academic research is inspired by a desire to investigate the challenges facing contemporary black Americans and to better understand the multiple, creative ways that African Americans respond to these challenges. Her work is published in scholarly journals and edited volumes and her interests include the study of African American political thought, black religious ideas and practice, and social and clinical psychology.

Tim is the author of four books, including the global best seller *Love Is The Killer App: How to Win Business & Influence Friends*. His second book, *The Likeability Factor* was featured in major media from USA Today to the New York Times. His latest book, *Today We Are Rich: Harnessing the Power of Total Confidence* is an *Inc. Magazine* business bestseller. Its message: "Take control of your outlook and get your confidence back!" is right for the times.

After graduate school and a short stint working with quality movement guru Ed Deming, Sanders went to work for Southwestern Bell Mobile systems at the birth of the U.S. cellular phone industry. He applied his expertise of quality, marketing and sales to help launch one of the most important industries of our time – wireless communications for the masses.

In 1996, Sanders went to work at broadcast.com for Mark Cuban, an audacious entrepreneur. After the company was sold to Yahoo!, Sanders created and led the Yahoo! ValueLab, an in-house "think tank" which delivered futuristic insight on technology and human behavior. While working there, he discovered that the company was moving too slowly for the innovation required at the time. Leading by example, he started a movement that inspired their executives to make more and faster decisions and to take calculated risks.

In 2002, Sanders was named Chief Solutions Officer at Yahoo!, at a time when the Internet industry was going through significant change and pressure from the stock market. He was charged with responding to multi-million dollar critical situations and empowered to make decisions in the field. From this experience, he learned that leadership is a personal decision, not just the function of a title.

Closing Speaker Renu Khator

Renu Khator holds the dual titles of chancellor of the University of Houston (UH) System and president of UH. The UH System's first woman Chancellor and the first Indian immigrant to head a comprehensive research university in the United States, she assumed her post in January 2008.

As chancellor of the UH System, Khator oversees an organization that serves more than 66,000 students, has a budget that exceeds \$1.3 billion, and has a \$3.5 billion-plus economic impact on the greater Houston area each year. The UH System includes UH, UH-Clear Lake, UH-Downtown, UH-Victoria and branch campuses in Pearland and NW Houston; teaching centers in Cinco Ranch and Sugar Land; as well as KUHT, the nation's first educational television station, and two radio stations - KUHF, Houston's National Public Radio affiliate, and the classical station KUHA.

As president of the University of Houston, she is the chief executive officer of the largest and oldest of the four UH System universities. UH enrolls 40,000-plus students, offers more than 300 undergraduate and graduate programs and awards 7,000 degrees each year.

During her tenure, UH has experienced record-breaking research funding, enrollment and private support. Recently, UH launched its 75-acre Energy Research Park, part of her \$400-million campus construction program, and became a member of the Texas Medical Center.

In 2011, UH became a Tier One university, with the Carnegie Foundation elevating it into the top category of research universities. The university was also recognized by the Princeton Review for excellence in undergraduate education and by The Chronicle for Higher Education as an exceptional workplace.

Khator was born in Uttar Pradesh, India, earning a bachelor's degree at the University of Kanpur. She received her master's degree and her Ph.D. in political science from Purdue University. A noted scholar in the field of global environmental policy, she has published numerous books and articles on the subject. Prior to her appointment, she was provost and senior vice president at the University of South Florida, capping a 22-year career at that institution.

The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services has included her among its Outstanding Americans by Choice awardees, recognizing her achievements as a naturalized citizen. She and her husband Suresh Khator, associate dean in the UH Cullen College of Engineering, were honored with the prestigious Hind Rattan (Jewel of India) award, given to nonresident Indians for making outstanding contributions in their field. Purdue University awarded her its Doctor of Social Sciences degree, honoris causa. She is featured in the American Council on Education's video "The Joys of the Presidency."

Khator recently joined some of the world's most respected leaders when she was named to the Indian Prime Minister's Global Advisory Council. She serves on several boards, including the American Council on Education, the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, the Greater Houston Partnership, the Houston Technology Center, the Texas Medical Center Policy Council, the Methodist Hospital Research Institute Board, and the Business Higher Education Forum. She is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Khator's husband, Suresh Khator, is associate dean of the UH Cullen College of Engineering. The Khators have two daughters, both of whom are ophthalmologists, and a grandson.



By building resilience through leadership development, students can deal with these difficult situations that may occur. Higher education is under increasing pressure to be accountable for student career outcomes. In July 2014, NASPA convened the first President's Summit on College, Careers and Employability, involving over a dozen student affairs leaders in re-thinking models of career preparation. New Orleans Map



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

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
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
